Statement of Intent

Our School Vision: At Townhill Junior School our central ethos is to develop a love of learning amongst all members of our community. By the time our children leave us, we want them to be confident learners, with high aspirations and motivated to succeed. Through an engaging and exciting curriculum, they will develop their ability to explore and be creative. Within the safe and secure environment of the school, and through rich and varied experiences in and beyond the school grounds, we will support them to become resilient, emotionally secure and caring citizens. Together our learners will discover that there is no limit to what they can achieve. We do this through our school Learning Values which are interwoven through all aspects of school life. They are as follows: Resourceful, Resilient, Reflective, Curious, Sociable and Positive.

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	High levels of child protection issues linked to domestic abuse, parental substance abuse and poverty
2	Lack of early nurture and educational support, meaning pupils start their schooling well below expected standards
3	Attendance not meeting national and persistent absence is above national
4	Planned and delayed regeneration of the estate has led to high levels of mobility and parental anxiety connected to this
5	High proportion of pupils exhibit behaviours reflecting poor mental health and well-being
6	Low levels of parental literacy amongst many families mean that parents struggle to support their children with their learning
7	Our disadvantaged learners particularly struggle with language acquisition, which impacts on all reading and writing
8	Disadvantaged learners perform lower than their peers in terms of a grasp of number and place value, which has a negative impact on their attainment across the Maths curriculum
9	Many of our learners have very limited life experiences beyond the immediate vicinity of their homes, which leads to them struggling to making conceptual links across curriculum areas and them having a very limited world view
10	Challenging home life making it difficult for them to focus on home learning

Further Information

Through charitable support, pupil premium learners take part in pre-teaching experiences, including trips and visitors in school, to support language acquisition and broadening their world view.

The school has implemented the Jigsaw PSHE programme, as this includes a focus on mindfulness and well-being. As per the EEF guidance, this is pivotal to disadvantaged learners performing well.

We run free half-termly extra-curricular clubs targeting disadvantaged learners. The focus is based on what the pupils identify as their own barriers but also includes a focus on relationship building.
